Caudill, Edward and Ashdown, Paul	<i>Sherman's March in Myth and Memory</i> (New York: Rowman and Littlefield, 2008), is a study in the development of the Sherman legends that arose during and immediately after the war and into the 20 <sup>th</sup> century.

Kennett, Lee B.	<i>Marching Through Georgia: The Story of Soldiers and Civilians during Sherman's Campaign</i> (New York: Harper Perennial, 2001), is a study of the culture of war and the impact of war on culture.
Royster, Charles	<i>The Destructive War: William Tecumseh Sherman, Stonewall Jackson, and the Americans</i> (New York: Knopf, 1991), provides an insightful analysis of the nature and legacy of Sherman's military tactics.
Sherman, William Tecumseh	<i>Memoirs of General W.T. Sherman</i> , (New York: Library of America, 1984, originally published 1875). Like the general, the work is to the point, with an unflinching, though obviously not disinterested, point of view about the general's accomplishments.
Lewis, Lloyd	<i>Sherman: Fighting Prophet</i> (New York: Harcourt, Brace, 1932), is dated, but is a very

	good window of the historiographic development of the Sherman legend.
Marszalek, John F.	<i>Sherman: A Soldier's Passion for Order</i> (New York: Free Press, 1993), remains the most detailed and in-depth study of Sherman's life.
